

During the 2014-15 school year, Mackintosh Academy welcomed two new Heads of School, Diane Dunne in Littleton and JJ Morrow in Boulder. In this year of change and transition, we continued to hone in on our mission of educating the keen minds and nurturing the compassionate hearts of our gifted students, while encouraging them to contribute their gifts to a world that needs them.

Enrollment on both our campuses continued to grow in 14-15, as word of our unique program and top-notch, dedicated teachers spread throughout the Front Range. One shining high point was receiving and implementing a \$95,000 grant written by Littleton students for the installation of solar panels on our school buildings. And our Boulder campus shone as well, with increased outreach and visibility in the Boulder community, via Maker Faires and parent outreach events. Another highlight in fall 2014 was the visit of William Mackintosh, former husband of our late founder Eve Mackintosh, to both campuses, where he delighted students and staff alike with his stories of the early days of the Academy.

The Board of Trustees focused on supporting our new Heads of School, growing our board, and planning for long-term strategic growth for the Academy. We launched a year-long strategic planning process, resulting in a long-term plan that will be shared with our community at our Annual Meetings, and we look forward to moving into the very exciting implementation phase of the plan. Our Board of Trustees grew not only in number, but in depth and breadth; for the first time in recent memory, our trustees now include current parents from each campus, as well as alum parents and prominent, dedicated community members.

In this Annual Report, we are pleased to share the details of Mackintosh Academy's accomplishments in 2014-15. Please read on for detailed reports from our Heads of School. We continue to work to fulfill its vision and to affirm, every day for every child, that they (and we) are "unique to the core."

#### LITTLETON CAMPUS NEWS //

What a bright and shining experience the 2014 – 2015 school year was for Mack Littleton! Our Year of the Sun began with a phone call from the State Farm Youth Advisory Board informing us that the grant application written by six of our sixth graders, as part of their Exhibition project the previous spring, had been approved. A check for over \$95,000 was on its way to install solar panels on all three of our buildings. And thus began a year-long celebration that engaged and inspired our entire community-- all of our students, their teachers and parents, as well as local and state government officials and business representatives.

Our highly competent, committed faculty worked tirelessly and joyfully to nurture the keen minds and compassionate hearts of their students. Within the framework of our IB program, our teachers were alive to the needs and potential of the gifted youngsters in the classroom, on the playground, and beyond the confines of our campus through science, social studies, and service trips to Cal-Wood, Washington DC, and the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota, Teachers continued their own professional development through IB training and attending workshops on gifted education through conferences, such as the annual Colorado Association of Talented and Gifted or traveling beyond Colorado to explore cutting edge research on learning and the brain. They also reached out into the community by bringing Mack's hands-on educational approaches to other families and fellow teachers at the Denver Mini-Makers Faire. Our strong collaborative administrative team, consisting of HOS, Assistant HOS/Admissions Director, Curriculum Coordinator, and Learning Specialist, managed the school environment in a way that best utilized our resources and strived to be responsive, proactive, and visionary. And continued collaboration with our Boulder colleagues opened our eyes to new ways of thinking and doing things.

The level of parent community involvement increased through a very active and organized Parent Council that hosted a series of parent coffees (two of which allowed parents to play with our new 3D printers) and events, such as Grand's Day and a spring Latino Festival. Our annual parent-run auction—Why Fit in When You Were Born to Stand Out!—was a celebratory social and fundraising event, netting \$30,000 for our campus. Parent Education outreach initiatives reached both current parents and others who were interested in topics related to raising gifted children. In addition to the annual auction, Amplify, our Annual Giving Campaign, reached budgeted goals and netted a record \$40,000 in donations, over \$19,000 of which was donated during one twenty-four-hour period on Colorado Gives Day.

And this is just a small sampling of the excitement and hard work that symbolized the 2014-2015 school year. The year that had begun so auspiciously ended with us all rejoicing in the reality of our bright new solar panels that speak eloquently of the energy and power of our young people to make the world a better place and to share joyfully in the accomplishments of others. What began as a collaborative project among sixth graders continues to generate not only electricity but also a reinvigorated commitment to coming together as a Mack community and IB World School, dedicated to internationalmindedness, the promotion of diversity through our Solar Scholars fund, a commitment to solving real world problems, and a recognition that we are a Smart Village, where, as one student said, We don't have to wait until we are grown up to make a difference in the world. #### LITTLETON ADMISSIONS NEWS //

The 2014-2015 admissions reflected a resurgence of interest in a Mackintosh education in the Littleton area. In spite of a slight drop in enrollment at the beginning of the year, we experienced a 30 percent increase in new student admissions, many of whom joined during the school year. The renewed interest in our campus was due in no small part to the increased media exposure surrounding our solar panel installation. Targeted marketing efforts, increased parent education events and regular open houses also served to reinvigorate interest in our campus.

The end of the school year was celebrated with the announcement of our Solar Scholars Program emphasizing our commitment to a diverse student body. In line with this philosophy we began concerted efforts to attract and retain students with a wide variety of economic and cultural backgrounds. We also looked more carefully at the male/female balance in our classrooms with a focus on efforts to attract gifted girls to our community. The addition of Middle Years ambassadors to our Open House tours resulted in positive community feedback and resulted in several bookings for student visits. We learned once again that the best way to share what Mackintosh does best is to share our students.

Our new online inquiry and application process allowed for quicker parent access and improved data collection. The process confirmed that about one quarter of our referrals come from professionals in the field and another quarter from current and past Mackintosh Families. As such, we continued our efforts in building relationships and expanding our exposure with professionals while improving our internal marketing. A wonderful film about our Middle Years experience, produced as a gift from former board member Eric Jones, debuted on our website to great reviews. One visiting parent commented that her son watched the video and exclaimed, "Wouldn't it be great to go to a school where the teachers really know me?"

#### BOULDER CAMPUS NEWS //

The 2014-2015 school year was a milestone in the history of our Boulder Campus. Our community came together to grow and strengthen in all aspects of school life. We established a safe and inviting culture that welcomed 14 new students mid-year. Our program expanded and welcomed innovative and creative initiatives. We created and/or improved important programmatic spaces including our Library, Great Hall, and Design Lab. Our financial stability turned a corner towards a brighter future.

Thanks to our aggressive marketing strategy and referrals we grew our student population from 86 to a peak of 101. The admissions growth was undoubtedly a result of increased "buzz" about Mack-Boulder thanks to our: parent education series, participation in three major maker faires, blogging, solidified Facebook strategy, and the creation of powerful partnerships with innovative people and organizations.

We worked hard this school year to strengthen the three pillars of our mission. We built a stronger, safer, and more supportive school culture using Responsive Classroom practices and methodologies. In our classrooms, teachers established morning and class meetings, classroom agreements, leadership activities, and a strong sense of social emotional growth. As a school we introduced a universal set of agreements thanks to the hard work of a student Citizenship Council.

Teaching teams also worked closely within our grade level teams and collaboratively with Littleton peers to deliver creative and robust IB curricula. We strived to infuse design-thinking and hands-on learning in all facets of our program. Our teachers empower their students to own their learning journey by living the Learner Profiles in our everyday lives, and by introducing opportunities for service-learning throughout the school year. The seeds for understanding and living with a global vision were also planted this school year as we looked to expand and improve our commitment in the future. We also used the success of our experiential education trips to D.C., Cal-Wood, and Pine Ridge to look towards expanding trips into lower grades in the near future.

Thanks to a significant gift towards professional development, teachers continued their growth through a menu of experiences including: IB trainings/workshops, attending the Colorado Association of Talented and Gifted annual conference, and Orton-Gillingham training for all K-4 teachers. Our campus also made an investment in curriculum and professional development materials focused on writing and reading resources.

Our growth in developing a culture of philanthropy and fundraising was impressive. We surpassed our Amplify Annual Giving Campaign's goal of \$80,000 to earn just over \$117,000. We were proud of our 100% Parent, Teacher, and Board participation. We also benefited from an array of generous major gifts, including a \$120,000 gift that seeded endowment, supported scholarship funds, and grew professional development funding. Our spring Auction was a successful social and fundraising event with a paddle raise that seeded over \$52,000 towards the creation of a permanent school library and state-of-the-art performing arts space.

The foundation for a bright future was laid in 2014-2015 thanks to partnerships with our Littleton campus, the guidance of our Board, leadership from several parent groups, support from grandparents and friends of our school, and countless hours of hard work from our teachers. We ended 2014-2015 with a profound sense of appreciation for all that was accomplished towards creating a permanent, innovative, and warm home for gifted learners in Boulder.

#### BOULDER ADMISSIONS NEWS //

A robust growth trend continued on the Boulder campus throughout the 2014-15 school year with a 14-student gain during the year, helping us reach a record 101 students at the peak of our enrollment. The momentum from this school year helped us start our 2015-2016 school year with 28 new students. All of our new families continue to bring a fresh perspective, energy and commitment to the school. Parent involvement is at all-time high, with a formal MPC (Mackintosh Parent Council) instigating multiple social, community-building, fundraising and community service events. The momentum - and sense of shared purpose and pride - at Mack Boulder couldn't be better.

Our Parent Education and Outreach events reached record highs with attendance averaging 80 people per occasion (up from a dozen or so the prior year). Our campus was fortunate to welcome experts in their fields: Linda Silverman, Patti Gatto-Walden, Garth Sundem, Karina Black, and Michael Vladick. These speakers, among others, helped fuel our commitment to support ongoing learning for our parent body and local community as well. Both Mack campuses also sponsored a gathering with over 300 people featuring renowned neuropsychologist Dr. Dan Siegal on the topic of the teenage brain, based on his book *Brainstorm*. Mack Boulder continued to push forward as a thought leader in parenting and gifted education, which drove interest in, and respect for, our school.

#### CURRICULUM UPDATE//

The 2014-2015 school year's curriculum ignited with solar panel implementation for the Littleton campus, enhancement of the creative and formal writing elements unique for Boulder, and major International Baccalaureate change for both campuses in the teaching guides of planning, teaching, and assessment for every subject within the Middle Years IB Programme.

Both campuses revisited many unit planners that they had taught before, allowing them to refine and hone their skills and the materials covered. Littleton teachers' comfort level with the material allowed them to take risks and forge new directions in inquiry activities. The solar panels from the previous year's 6th grade Exhibition project were installed, which provided excellent teaching opportunities in energy consumption, as well as how to collaborate with local professionals and the media, and how to develop meaningful and engaging presentations—important life skills they will utilize in many future endeavors. All classes explored researchbased, innovative ways to bring growth mind-set, social-emotional learning, and authentic inquiry into the classroom environment. Authentic and innovative inquiry, opposed to teacher-directed activities, were the focus of all classrooms. The Boulder campus, with many new teachers and staff, honed the IB inquiry process, incorporated design thinking makers' activities, social-emotional learning, and, especially, enhanced the writing aspects within their curriculum through an in-depth professional learning community.

Littleton and Boulder worked together to orchestrate the Interdisciplinary Planner for the Middle Years Program. This included studies in Individuals and Society (Humanities/History) and Language and Literature (English) to prepare for a week-long service trip to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota as part of the Re-Member organization. This is the second time our students have worked at Pine Ridge. It is one of the hallmarks of the action-service component of our curricular programming. Our 5<sup>th</sup>-6<sup>th</sup> grade students (6th grade only in Boulder) went on their bi-annual Washington D.C. trip, a key part of their American Revolutionary War and U.S. Government studies. We were proud of our students who politely and confidently asked critical thinking questions of our legislators. Our classes all completed strong performances and took risks in their artwork, building the confidence and collaboration skills in performing and visual arts, developing alternative ways to demonstrate their understandings.

The IB Middle Years Programme had a "Next Generation" change to all eight subjects as issued by the International Baccalaureate Organization. This included changes to all subject teaching guides, approaches to learning, approaching to teaching, and approaches to assessment. The students saw the most change in the assessment rubrics. A majority of the change happened for teachers within the documentation aspects of the learning process. The careful planning aspects translate into stronger teaching and assessment, creating an environment which students are required to be critical thinkers and go a "mile deep" exploring concepts and making connections.
